Max Ray Haller, age 87, died Tuesday, May 3, 2011 at Tacoma General Hospital following a brief illness. During this time, he showed all those around him tremendous courage and strength. He touched the lives of many people with his smile and maintained his trademark sense of humor and "charisma" all the way to the end. He leaves his six children, Pamela (Haller) Rang, Larry Haller, Daniel Haller, Richy Haller, Cathy (Haller) Jacobson and Randal Haller; 13 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren and seven great-great grandchildren.
